Must get your own transportation

Need your own financial resources

No help securing public assistance and vital records

Must secure your own medical, mental health and substance use disorder treatment

Limited access to peers and reentry assistance


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TRANSITIONAL

PROS

Housing, transportation, and basic needs are met

Job placement or vocational training

Medical, mental health and substance use disorder treatment

Living with peers

Help getting public assistance

Case management services may help with supervision

CONS

Time at residence limited, usually to 6-12 months

Rules, curfews and blackout periods

Required attendance classes

Many facilities are located in urban areas


No private space

- 7. Does your family have a permanent, private space for you to use?
